

4.6.2.9 Alternative 5c

There is one recreation resource within the bandwidth for Alternative 5c and one in the 0.4 km (0.25 mi) buffer area. The western portion of Alternative 5c follows I-15, Nichols Road, and Riverside Street, and closely follows Canyon Lake and the San Jacinto River. The western portion of the alternative would directly impact Kabian County Park in the City of Perris. The southeastern portion of Alternative 5c along Mathews Road, Briggs Road, Olive Avenue, and Domenigoni Parkway would have no direct impacts to parklands, wildlife refuges, recreation areas, or other public lands. There is one school in the 0.4 km (0.25 mi) buffer area for Alternative 5c. The school could potentially be affected by indirect air quality, noise, and visual effects of this alternative. Approximately 2,589 m (8,495 ft) of trails would intersect the bandwidth of Alternative 5c. The trails are comprised of Class I Bike paths, regional trails, and community trails.

4.6.2.10 Alternative 5d

There are no recreation resources within the bandwidth for Alternative 5d and seven in the 0.4 km (0.25 mi) buffer area. Tuscan Hills Community Park in Lake Elsinore and Kabian County Park in the City of Perris are within the buffer area of the western portion of Alternative 5d that begins along the I-15 and closely follows Canyon Lake and the San Jacinto River. There are five schools in the 0.4 km (0.25 mi) buffer area for Alternative 5d. The schools could potentially be affected by indirect air quality, noise, and visual effects of this alternative. Approximately 7,396 m (24,264 ft) of trails would intersect the bandwidth of Alternative 5d. The trails are comprised of Class I Bike paths, regional trails, and community trails.

4.6.2.11 Alternative 5e

There are no recreation resources within the bandwidth for Alternative 5e and three in the 0.4 km (0.25 mi) buffer area. Kabian County Park in the City of Perris is located within the buffer area of the western portion of Alternative 5e that parallels Riverside Drive and closely follows Canyon Lake and the San Jacinto River. There are two schools in the 0.4 km (0.25 mi) buffer area for Alternative 5e. The schools could potentially be affected by indirect air quality, noise, and visual effects of this alternative. Approximately 6,162 m (20,217 ft) of trails would intersect the bandwidth of Alternative 5e. The trails are comprised of Class I Bike paths, regional trails, and community trails.

4.6.2.12 Alternative 6a

There are no recreation resources within the bandwidth for Alternative 6a. There are four parks and four schools in the 0.4 km (0.25 mi) buffer area. The parks and schools could potentially be affected by indirect air quality, noise, and visual effects of this alternative. Approximately 2,199 m (7,216 ft) of trails would intersect the bandwidth of Alternative 6a. The trails are comprised of Class I Bike paths, regional trails, and community trails.
