

4.12.2.8 Alternative H

Because development of the Alternative H would result in widening of existing Interstate 215, and the right-of-way for this freeway has been largely cleared of cultural resources, development of this alternative would probably have the least impact on cultural resources. Development of Alternative H could result in impacts to one multi-component site, three milling sites, one long-term occupation site, and two undetermined sites. Two historic buildings are also present within the bandwidth. It is probable that these sites have been previously impacted by existing infrastructure. The multi-component site and one prehistoric site have been listed on the National Register (NR#: 73000424). Two prehistoric resources on this Alternative, CA-RIV-50 and CA-RIV-365, have been listed on the National Register and are the location of the ethnographic village of *Temeku*, the predecessor of Temecula.

4.12.3 Results of Consultations

A records search of the sacred lands file of the NAHC was conducted on October 26, 2001. The sacred lands file check identified three sacred sites: *Murrieta Village* (Pechanga USGS Quadrangle, T7S, R3W), *Pechanga Reservation Cemetery* (Pechanga USGS Quadrangle, T8S, R2W), and the *Pauba Cemetery* (Pechanga USGS Quadrangle, T8S, R2W). These sacred sites are located along the 5a alignment. The NAHC identified 10 potentially interested Native American individuals or groups.

Certified letters were sent to all addresses provided by the NAHC. Subsequently, phone calls were placed to the identified people, and records of concerns were made. Two Native Americans, Alvino Siva and Katherine Saubel, expressed concerns, particularly with the WT 5a and 5b alignments.

4.12.4 Results of the Historical Architecture Survey

A total of twelve previously unrecorded properties was recorded during the survey, including four historic residences and eight historic building complexes (a residence and
